

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## 1. Introduction and Project Details

Redbed Resources Corp. (further referred to as Redbed) has developed this Engagement Plan (or Plan) for the Redstone Property, NT, in accordance with the Mackenzie Valley Land and Water Board's [Engagement and Consultation Policy](#) (Policy) and the [Engagement Guidelines for Applicants and Holders of Water Licences and Land Use Permits](#) (Guidelines).

### 1.1. **Project Description**

The Redstone 2019 Exploration Program will involve work on the Coates Lake, Hayhook and Hidden Valley area claims and leases, predominantly those set to expire this year. A desktop study will be completed prior to commencing fieldwork. Fieldwork will include geological mapping, rock chip sampling, and soil sampling.

Redbed Resources Corp. (Redbed) anticipates these activities will occur over a two week period in August 2019.

Work will be based at the Coates Lake camp, subject to renewal of the Land Use Permit. All transportation from the camp to the working areas will be by helicopter and all travel on the ground will be on foot.

The footprint left behind must be acceptable to the affected aboriginal people for their future use and to ensure the safety of local wildlife and plants.

### 1.2. **Site Description**

The Redstone Property is located on NTS sheets 95 L/10, 15 and 95M/2,6,11,14 in the Nahanni Mining District of the Northwest Territories, Canada. The property is centred about 63° 11' N latitude and 127° 16' W longitude or UTM 587,100 E 7,007,685 N (NAD83, Zone 9N) (Figure 1). A 1:50,000 scale map of the project study area is provided.

The property is comprised of four discontinuous lease/claim blocks (Coates Lake, Hidden Valley, Johnson Vein, and Hayhook; Tables 1 and 2) located along a NW-SE axis over a distance of approximately 96km. The property is approximately 170km west of Wrigley, 150km SW of Tulita, 170km S of Norman Wells, and 280km NW of Fort Simpson. The Coates Lake block is located in the Dehcho region, with the other three blocks located in the Sahtu settlement region.

The Redbed Resources camp facility is located at the north end of Coates Lake and is comprised of 8 temporary structures, located as shown in Figure 2:

- 2 14'x16' wood floor tent frames.
- 2 14'x16' wood floors (frames removed).
- 1 10'x12' wood floor (frame removed).
- 1 14'x20' wood floor and tent frame with canvas tent cover (kitchen tent) – houses the fridge and stove.
- 1 14'x16' wood floor and plywood covered building (used as storage building when camp not in operation and Dry when camp is in operation) – houses the hot water tank, plastic shower, water

tank, and plumbing materials. The building currently stores pots and pans and other kitchen gear and tent coverings for the other buildings.

1 6'x4'x4' generator shack housing a 6 kW diesel generator.

The buildings are located 50m to 90m from the high water line of Coates Lake (Figure 2), well in excess of the minimum 31 m setback specified in INAC (2011). Greywater from the kitchen and dry reports to a sump pit (2m x 2m x 1m deep) excavated behind (upslope) of these tents and approximately 55m from the lake. Sewage disposal is in a pit privy located approximately 90m from the lake.

A temporary floating dock ("T"-shaped, approximately 4m long, with a 4m wide T, and 1.5m wide decking) will be located on Coates Lake to facilitate loading and unloading of float planes. The dock is constructed and will be installed in accordance with the Department of Fisheries and Oceans Dock and Boathouse Construction Operational Statement.

Access to the property is by chartered helicopter or fixed wing aircraft, either float or wheel equipped, from Fort Simpson, Wrigley, Tulita, Norman Wells, or the Cantung Mine. The Coates Lake camp infrastructure also includes an approximately 1,100ft long airstrip located approximately 3.9km SSE of the camp (Figure 3) that was constructed in the 1960's.

The camp is currently maintained under authorization (File MV2012J0017) that expires on July 17, 2019. All proposed work will be based out of the Coates Lake camp.

The Redstone property was extensively drilled in 1960-1980 by:

- (1) Redstone Mines Ltd.: geological mapping and 45 diamond drill holes totalling 6,902m;
- (2) Cerro Mining Company of Canada Ltd: 3 diamond drill holes totalling 1,375m; and,
- (3) Shell Canada Resources Ltd.: 8 diamond drill holes for a total of 7,225m.

In 1990 Redstone Mines Limited carried out a complete data review, confirmation mapping, identification of drill targets, and location of potential drill sites.

In 2005 Lumina Resources Corp. completed an exploration program and a regional geological evaluation of the Redstone copper belt.

Western Copper Corporation acquired Lumina Resources in November 2006. The claims and leases were acquired by Copper North Mining following the corporate re-structuring of Western Copper in late 2011. Copper North Mining Corp., through its wholly-owned subsidiary Redbed Resources Corp., held the mineral claims and leases that are commonly known as the Redstone Property up until recently.

In April 2019 Copper North sold Redbed Resources Corp. to H. Coyne & Sons Ltd., a long-established Whitehorse, Yukon company owned by the Coyne family. H. Coyne & Sons Ltd. is an aggregate supplier to Whitehorse and the surrounding area and they also supply heavy equipment and operators to many mineral exploration projects across the Yukon.

The Coyne family also owns Kluane Drilling Ltd., a Whitehorse-based exploration drilling company that counts many of the world's largest mining companies as clients and has drills turning on projects in many parts of the world.

Both companies boast a high number of local and First Nations hires, take pride in their rigorous health and safety programs and always demonstrate the utmost respect for the environment.

## 2. Engagement Strategy

The purpose of this Plan is to provide a formal written framework on how Redbed will communicate with and reach out to potentially affected parties throughout the various phases of the development of this specific Project.<sup>1</sup> Redbed recognizes the political, social, environmental, and economic landscape of the North and acknowledges that this Project is located on the traditional lands of aboriginal peoples. Redbed considers the Plan to be a living document, meaning that it will evolve and be updated as site activities progress, change, or advance towards further development. Further engagement will be conducted if Redbed needs to apply to or request the following items from the Land and Water Board: amendments, modifications, extensions, renewals, storage authorizations, or assignments. Redbed recognizes that the benefits of engaging are long-term and are an investment in achieving our vision of being a responsible and welcome member of the communities in which we operate.

This Plan will help Redbed do a better job because it provides a means to share ideas, plans, and values while receiving input from affected parties about potential concerns and mitigations.

Once affected parties were selected as further described in Section 3 below, the following steps were taken to develop Redbed's overall engagement strategy:



### 3. Affected Parties

For this Project, Redbed has identified several Aboriginal governments and organizations as affected parties. Additional organizations have been identified which have a potential, indirect, or more general interests in the Project. These parties and organizations include:

## 5. Engagement Triggers and Methods

Redbed has defined engagement triggers at key milestones in for this Project, as they relate to project activities authorized under a land use permit and/or water licence. Engagement may be conducted as written notification, a face to face meeting, or a community public meeting, once consideration is given to the following guiding principles, as recommended by Mackenzie Valley Land and Water Board:

1. The nature and scope of engagement efforts should reflect the magnitude and complexity of the Project.
2. Both the affected parties and/or Proponent can run the risk of “consultation fatigue” from too many or inappropriate engagements. Engagement methods and schedules must, by mutual agreement, be reasonable and sustainable for both Proponents and affected parties.
3. The nature of the Engagement methods and frequency of engagement will change through time as affected parties and Proponents gain trust and the Project develops. The Engagement Plan should be reviewed as the relationship of the affected parties and Proponent and/or Project reaches mutually determined milestones.

The following table outlines Redbed’s triggers, methods, and outcomes of engagement for this Project. At each stage of engagement, an Engagement Log will be complete and will be submitted to the Mackenzie Valley Land and Water Board with the request from Redbed. A templated Engagement Log is provided in Appendix B of this document. The Engagement Log is submitted as a separate document from the Plan however, both documents work together. An Engagement Log will be complete for each trigger outlined below.

## 6. Follow-Up Reporting

During engagement activities, Redbed will track comments, concerns or inputs, received relating to a permitted or licensed activity and will provide a summary as detailed in Section 5 above. In order to process comments, concerns and input throughout the engagement process, Redbed will endeavor to respond in a timely manner, respecting the nature of the input.

Reporting on an engagement after it has been completed is an important step in the engagement process as it ensures that those involved see their input was received, understood, and valued. All Engagement Logs will acknowledge those that participated and will provide an accurate record of the engagement process, and how final decisions were reached.

## 7. Communicating the Plan

Communicating the Engagement Plan is an important element to the success of the engagement process. Affected parties need to be aware who they can contact in the event they are seeking information or clarification on a project related matter. While Redbed intends to use engagement methods already familiar to them, they do recognize that not all potentially affected parties are the same and that what might work for one particular group or individual may not be the best method of engagement for another. Redbed is open to applying methods that work best for a particular situation and affected party. Keeping that line of communication open will build a rapport and establish a trust.

## 8. Implementing the Plan

For the company, this reduces the uncertainty in approaches, application of methods, and expectations for both affected parties and the Proponent. This version of the Engagement Plan incorporates the thinking and guidelines of the Mackenzie Valley Land and Water Board, best practices, hence, represents “the forward looking document” that will be implemented according to the recommend workplan and schedule.

## 9. Plan Review

It is important that engagement efforts be monitored and where a method does not appear to be effective or when the scope of importance of an issue changes, it will be necessary to modify the Engagement Plan. Evaluating the effectiveness of the engagement process is a fundamental part of the Engagement Plan as it is important to understand what was done well and what could be improved upon moving forward. Redbed and the affected parties will assess the effectiveness of its engagement efforts over the course of time and will make necessary changes on a case by case basis. Any revisions to the Engagement Plan will be forwarded to the Mackenzie Valley Land and Water Board.
