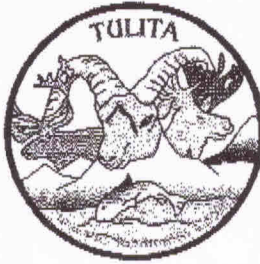

Dear Mr. Wallace:

The Tulit'a Renewable Resources Council (TRRC) is aware of the subject license/permit applications. We have discussed these thoroughly with a special focus on wildlife-related issues. We have also reviewed comments being prepared by the Sahtú Renewable Resources Board (SRRB) related to the application, and are in full support of the recommendations.

Further to the SRRB's comments we would like to contribute our own input based on our knowledge and experience as harvesters, and in our interactions with Husky over the past year. We have several general concerns about the proposed activities related to *cumulative impacts, monitoring, consultation and traditional knowledge studies*. Moreover, we have special concerns about the potential impacts of the all-weather road.

Cumulative Impacts

As with the MGM and ConocoPhillips applications this year, we continue to be concerned that the impacts of all the exploration and eventual development activities at the same time will have major and lasting impact on an important portion of our traditional harvesting territory. We feel strongly that the exploration and development is happening at a speed that is not sustainable for our people. Our people do not have time to be adequately prepared for what is happening. Please refer to our previous letters regarding MGM and ConocoPhillips applications for similar statements of concern.

We urge that the three companies operating in the shale oil play area make every effort to coordinate activities, including research and monitoring, to minimize impacts. In particular, we note that the proposed all-weather road will have impacts on important harvesting species for our community, including boreal caribou (listed as a Species At Risk), moose, and furbearers. We have specific concerns about the wildlife mitigation measures listed in the Environmental Protection Plan – these are described below.
