**Re: Archaeological Overview Assessment of the Fort Providence Forest Management Area**

We have reviewed the above captioned report. We concur with the management recommendations outlined in the report. An archaeological impact assessment (AIA) should be completed for areas rated as moderate or high potential by the AOA prior to development activities, and a helicopter flyover (or pedestrian survey for areas accessible by road in the summer) of a sample of low-moderate potential areas should be done to identify areas of elevated archaeological potential that may have been missed by the model employed for the AOA; this is particularly important given the difficulties encountered in modelling the topography of the area. An AIA should be completed for areas of elevated potential identified during the reconnaissance of the modeled low-moderate areas.
